# URGH! A MUSIC WAR

# **DEFINITIONS:**

- 1) **Erg**-n. (Gk ergon work): a cgs unit of work equal to the work done by a force of one dyne acting through a distance of one centimeter.
- 2) URGH!-n. (Lat. deriv.): an A&M vinyl unity of incredibly diverse music equal to the work done by a force of twenty-seven musical dynamos acting through a distance of two albums.

# THE STORY:

If there's one producer who knows the value of the new, it's Michael White. Aside from having produced numerous West End shows in London, he's been the executive producer of Monty Python and the Holy Grail, The Rocky Horror Picture Show, and the Clash's Rude Boy.

And if there's one talent booker who knows the value of the new, it's Ian Copeland, president of Frontier Booking International, which handles nearly three-fourths of the new music performers in the world.

And if there's one manager who knows the value of the new, it's Miles Copeland. President of the International Record Syndicate, the leading independent new music label, he's most recently escorted new music hit-men, the Police, to the top of the charts.

Taking all this into consideration, it's not at all surprising that when Michael White got it in his head to produce a documentary of new music, Miles and Ian became the creative consultants on the project. Instrumental in this awesome coalition was Gil Friesen, president of A&M Records, with whom White had previously worked on Rocky Horror. When White came to Friesen with his concept, Friesen told him that Miles would be the one man who could help him realize his vision. Miles brought Ian into the effort; while Ian booked practically all of the bands in conjunction with several friendly promoters here in the U.S. during the summer of 1980, Miles brought several other bands together with the Police for concerts in England and France. Everything was filmed by director Derek Burbridge, and the result is URGH!, a film soundtrack that presents—without frills, without padding, without tripe—the sounds of things to come.

## THE ARTISTS:

In order of their appearance on URGH! A MUSIC WAR, these eclectic talents well represent the future of music:

#### THE POLICE

Exhibiting an astonishing range, both musically and lyrically, the Police specialize in blistering rock coupled with idyllic reggae rhythms. #### **TOYAH WILCOX**
