Tommy LiPuma is running around bugging anyone who will listen to get them to record some of Newman's tunes. He talked Liza Minnelli and Claudine Longet into recording one each. He's going after Nick DeCaro next!

Anyway, I was hoping you might have a minute to give this a listen and let me know what you think. Tommy brought this to us, too, and it seems to be an exercise in film scoring. Randy wrote the whole darn thing and I'm including a copy of his hand written text. I thought, also, that you might find his solo demo interesting...creative process and all that. Pretty sure you'll agree that he doesn't have much of a future as a singer. We approached Gregory Peck to do the narration and he seemed interested, but then backed out at the last minute. We ended up using Ricardo Montalban for his latin accent. We had Peter Whorf whip up the enclosed scroll of the words but we're not sure what to do with it. Whorf did the Whipped Cream cover for us (and he used the same border design over again here...hmmm?).

So, what do you think? Should we sign this guy or not?
